
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SISTER ISLANDER OF THE QUARTER

Virgin Gorda



Someone once told me, "You're a Virgin Gordian, born and bred"—and that is exactly who I am. However, being a Virgin Gordian means more than birthplace. It is about loving your community, wishing it well, and doing your part to help it thrive.

I was born in Handsome Bay, Virgin Gorda, in the home of my great-grandmother, Mrs. Alecia White-George. I entered this world on a cool November evening, welcomed by the capable hands of the late Nurse Iris O'Neal. I am the eldest child of the late Melody "Mello" Lennard and the late Chef Alain Boutin. I am also proud to be a Salt Island descendant.

Today, my passion for preserving Virgin Islands culture is stronger than ever, especially as our Territory continues to grow and now includes people from more than 115 nationalities. I currently serve as the Deputy Director of Culture within the Virgin Islands Department of Culture. Of all the roles I've held in my professional life, my most impactful was during my time at the BVI Tourist Board and Film Commission. As the first woman to serve as Director of Tourism and Film Commission, I had the privilege of representing these beautiful islands around the globe—from Los Angeles to London, Italy to Central America. I promoted the Virgin Islands not just as a tourist destination but also as a location for film and photography, all while gaining deeper respect for both our homeland and the cultures I encountered abroad.

One of the highlights of my year is always our Emancipation Festival—our largest and most vibrant cultural celebration. I have worked in various capacities, from organizing sponsorships and coordinating contests like the long-standing Uncle Ben's Rice and Peas Contest to promoting the festivities through the BVI Tourist Board. In 2005, when the VI Festivals and Fairs Committee became a statutory body, I was proud to be appointed its first Chairperson. More recently, I've taken the lead in organizing the Traditional Torch Light Procession and Parade, which continues to grow in both participation and spirit.

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I am also one of nearly seventy women whose names are etched in our history as titleholders of Miss British Virgin Islands. I had the honour of representing the Territory in the Miss Universe Pageant, as well as representing Virgin Gorda in the Miss Jaycees Caribbean Queen Show in Antigua and the Miss Caribbean Sunrise Pageant in St. Croix.

Earlier this year, in March, I was humbled to be one of 27 individuals to receive the first National Commendation Award—presented by Premier, Honourable Dr. Natalio Wheatley, on behalf of the Government of the Virgin Islands. It was given in recognition of my contributions to the Hamilton Lavity Stoutt Memorial events and for my efforts in preserving his legacy.

As I grow older, my faith in the Almighty deepens. Life's journey—with its many hills and valleys—has tested me, particularly through the loss of loved ones and, more recently, a devastating fire that severely damaged my home. Today, my primary focus is on supporting and guiding my daughter, Mia, as she begins her own path into adulthood. I firmly believe in the power of daily prayer—especially over our children.

While some may see me as a community activist, I simply view myself as someone who speaks up when it matters. My time as District Officer for Virgin Gorda and as Red Cross Coordinator following the disasters of 2017 opened my eyes to the growing number of vulnerable people in our community. I hope we, as a society, continue to support all those—young and old—affected by domestic violence, a cause close to my heart.

In closing, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to everyone who has supported and prayed for me through the years. I truly appreciate each and every one of you. Special thanks to the team at the Sister Islands Programme Unit for your continued dedication to our communities.

In honor of my ancestors, I proudly say: I am Anne Lennard—Boutin, Stevens, White, George, Vanterpool, Jennings.

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ARC - Animal Rescue Virgin Gorda

On the island of Virgin Gorda, a compassionate group of volunteers - affectionately known by many as "the animal ladies," including Ramona, Tina, Elaine, and others—has dedicated decades to the welfare of animals. Formally known as ARC (Animal Rescue Virgin Gorda), this non-profit volunteer organization has been a vital force for over 50 years, working tirelessly to improve the lives of animals across the island.

ARC's core mission is to promote responsible pet ownership through education and advocacy, with a strong emphasis on the importance of

spaying and neutering. The organization provides free spay and neuter services, along with essential wellness care, helping to reduce stray populations and improve overall animal health.

With continued support from the community, ARC hopes to one day establish a full-service animal shelter on Virgin Gorda. Such a facility would provide a safe haven for abandoned or homeless animals until they can be placed in loving, permanent homes.

For over half a century, ARC has been a beacon of kindness and commitment. Through the dedication of its volunteers and the generosity of the community, it continues to be a vital lifeline for animals in need.



JVD Advancement Team – Committed to the Progress of Jost Van Dyke

The **JVD Advancement Team** is a passionate group of volunteers working to improve the quality of life on Jost Van Dyke. Their mission is to unify the island community and collaborate with local agencies, businesses, and government to enhance key areas such as healthcare, infrastructure, the environment, and youth development.



Hurricanes are the most violent and powerful storms that form over the ocean. They bring high winds that can blow up to 200 mph (miles per hour). Hurricanes also bring heavy rain, floods and a storm surge from the ocean.

These storm surges can cause major damage and devastation. Hurricanes often last for many hours, even days and can be up to 600 miles wide! The name for a hurricane can vary depending on where it forms. We call these storms hurricanes when they form over the Atlantic Ocean, cyclones in the Indian Ocean and typhoons in the Pacific.


